Los Angeles, CA; May 23, 2018 - Art + Practice (A+P) and The Baltimore Museum of Art (BMA) present a solo exhibition of work by the artist Senga Nengudi in Leimert Park, Los Angeles. *Head Back and High: Senga Nengudi, Performance Objects (1976-2017)*, on view at A+P from June 23 through August 25, 2018, brings together performance photographs and video from Nengudi's breakthrough moment of the mid-1970s with extraordinary examples of her early and most recent work in sculpture. The exhibition is presented in collaboration with the BMA.

"A+P is pleased to welcome *Head Back and High* to Los Angeles. Nengudi's ability to infuse her career-long exploration of the ethics of friendship and collective creativity into her artistic practice is unprecedented," said A+P's Executive Director Allan DiCastro. "A+P is grateful to the BMA for its ongoing support and curatorial expertise in thoughtfully organizing an exhibition of artworks by an artist that A+P greatly admires".

In the 1970s, Senga Nengudi (American, b. 1943) emerged as a leader at the forefront of experimental art-making, bringing together abstract sculpture and performance art. Today, she continues to construct poetic environments out of pantyhose, sand, air conditioning parts, and other items salvaged from everyday use. In Nengudi's hands, these materials take on symbolic meanings that relate to the resilience and vulnerability of the human body and to the forces, both social and psychological, that shape our experiences of the world.

"Senga Nengudi's work is known for inviting viewers to participate and respond, and collectively the BMA and A+P welcome the opportunity to host the dialogue and discovery that's sure to come during *Head Back and High*," said BMA Dorothy Wagner Wallis Director Christopher Bedford. "Collaborating with A+P on this exhibition presents yet another chance to redefine the meaning and impact of art."

Head Back and High is the second in a series of four exhibitions to be presented by the BMA and A+P, two vastly different institutions at opposite ends of the country who share a conviction that museum-curated contemporary art museum be made accessible to the broadest demographic.

An exhibition walkthrough with BMA Assistant Curator of Contemporary Art Cecilia Wichmann will take place at A+P on Saturday, June 23, 2018 at 2:00 p.m. The public opening reception for *Head Back and High* will take place at A+P on June 23, 2018 from 2:00 – 5:00 p.m. at A+P's exhibition space. No RSVPs are required and street parking will be available.

ABOUT SENGA NENGUDI

Born in Chicago in 1943 and raised in Los Angeles, Senga Nengudi trained in art and dance and earned an MFA in sculpture at California State University. Her touring solo exhibition, Senga Nengudi: Improvisational Gestures, originated at the Museum of Contemporary Art, Denver. Her work has also been the subject of solo exhibitions at the Institute of Contemporary Art, Miami; White Cube, London; and Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Art, Philadelphia. Group exhibitions include Viva Arte Viva, 2017 Venice Biennale; Soul of a Nation: Art in the Age of Black Power, Tate, London, Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art, and Brooklyn Museum; We Wanted a Revolution: Black Radical Women, 1965–85, Brooklyn Museum; Radical Presence: Black Performance in Contemporary Art, Contemporary Art Museum, Houston, and The Studio Museum in Harlem; Now Dig This! Art and Black Los Angeles 1960–1980, Hammer Museum, MoMA PS1, and Williams College Art Museum; and WACK! Art and the Feminist Revolution, Museum of Contemporary Art, Los Angeles, and MoMA PS1.

Based in Colorado Springs, Nengudi is an advocate for cultural literacy and access to arts education. From 1998 to 2008, she was lecturer at the University of Colorado, Colorado Springs. In 2016, she was awarded an Honorary Doctorate from Colorado College and a United States Artists Fellowship. She is recipient of the 2010 Women's Caucus on Art Lifetime Achievement Award, 2005–2006 Anonymous Was A Woman Award, and 2005–2006 Louis Tiffany Foundation Biennial Competition Award. Nengudi is represented by Thomas Erben Gallery, New York, and Lévy Gorvy Gallery, New York, London.

ABOUT THE BALTIMORE MUSEUM OF ART

Founded in 1914, The Baltimore Museum of Art is a major cultural destination recognized for engaging diverse audiences through dynamic exhibitions and innovative educational and community outreach programs. The BMA's internationally renowned collection of 95,000 objects encompasses more than 1,000 works by Henri Matisse anchored by the famed Cone Collection of modern art, as well as one of the nation's finest holdings of prints, drawings, and photographs. The galleries showcase an exceptional collection of art from Africa; important works by established and emerging contemporary artists; outstanding European and American paintings, sculpture, and decorative arts; significant artworks from China; ancient Antioch mosaics; and exquisite textiles from around the world.
